





DID YOU KNOW??

From our Sister Lodge Bondelandet 3-612 First Quarter 2025 newsletter Nordic Literary Event at Library of Congress



The Library of Congress recently collaborated with the Nordic embassies in Washington D.C. to celebrate fiction and non-fiction works being published in those countries. Each embassy invited an author to represent their country at the forum, which was attended by Norwegian Ambassador Anniken Huitfeldt.

The authors in attendance included: Josefine Klougart from Denmark, Hanna Pylväinen from Finland, Hanne Ørstavik of Norway, Hildur Knútsdóttir from Iceland, and Moa Herngren from Sweden. During the separate panel events, two different themes were discussed. One theme dealt with the Nordic landscape, which featured heavily in the works of the Danish and Finnish authors. Pylväinen's work, "The End of Drum-Time" and Klougart's "On Darkness" both move beyond the usual assumption in their writings that the Nordic landscape is cold and forbidding. The second theme revolved around the keeping of secrets – both from others and ourselves. This theme is found in the other three authors' work – Ørstavik's "Ti Amo," Herngren's "The Divorce," and Knútsdóttir's "The Night Guest." During this panel, Norwegian author Ørstavik discussed her own longing for truth, being vulnerable, and emphasized the need for having a listener in your life. She also suggested that books can even fill these needs at times.

Cultimal Corner: The Giant's Mountain - part 1



History Article: The Battle of Hastings: -- part 7

During the course of the battle William had three horses killed under him and was forced to ride round the field, his head bared, to reassure his army that he was unhurt; assisted by his half-brother Odo, Bishop of Bayeux, in rallying the Norman soldiers. A particularly savage fight developed around the position held by the now severely wounded Harold and his royal house-carles. Finally, the Saxon King was killed, followed by his brothers, Earl Gurth and Earl Leofwin, and the remaining house-carles. It was late afternoon and much of the remnants of the Saxon army gave way, fleeing the field; although a significant force continued to fight. The battle finally ended with all the remaining Saxons killed.

The heaped bodies were cleared from the center of the battlefield, William's tent pitched and a celebratory dinner held.

It was some time before Saxon England acknowledged William as king. William was forced to march to the West and cross the Thames at Wallingford in Oxfordshire before circling round from the North and capturing London, devastating the countryside as he marched. The Tower of London was the first of the castles William built to dominate and subjugate England. William was finally crowned in Westminster Abbey on Christmas Day 1066 by the Saxon Archbishop, Aldred of York.

In March 1067 William returned to Normandy, leaving Odo, Bishop of Bayeux, to continue the process of building castles and subjugating the population. William only returned to England on four further occasions. William the Conqueror died following the capture of Mantes in 1087, leaving England to be ruled by William II and Normandy by his eldest son Robert. Probably only20,000 Normans and other Frenchmen came to England as a result of the Conquest. Nevertheless, the Saxon country was transformed, French becoming the language of administration and government and the Conqueror's followers displacing the native nobility. The Saxons lamented their lost freedom for two centuries while England now looked across the Channel for cultural and political inspiration. Conquest in France remained the obsession of the Frankish kings of England until the 16th Century. French names predominated among the nobility and the military classes

'Oslo' marks its latest 100 years

January 1, 2025 - It's now officially been 100 years since city and state officials changed the name of the Norwegian capital back to its original "Oslo," from the end of the Viking age. No longer would the name of the biggest city in the still-newly independent Norway reflect former Danish rulers. It was on Thursday January 1 1925 that residents of the Norwegian capital woke up to living in "Oslo" and not "Kristiania," or "Christiania" even before that. It was an international event of sorts, since it's not every day that a rapidly growing national capital changes its name.

The newspaper Norges Handels og Sjøfarts Tidende, forerunner to newspaper Dagens Næringsliv (DN), noted at the time that British newspapers published lengthy reports and photos of Oslo, wished it well and even made a few jokes about the name change. It would, reported London's *Daily Herald*, at least be easier for school children to write and spell. The name change could also, other commentators wrote, even set an example for Iceland. Behind the name change was a lot of Norwegian pride in Norway's rising prosperity at the time, its polar exploration accomplishments and relatively recent emergence as its own sovereign nation with its own new royal family. Norway had broken out of an unhappy union with Sweden just 20 years earlier, in 1905. Before that, Norway had been under Danish rule since its own former monarchy and clergy had been mostly wiped out by the plague that hit in 1349. Norway's centuries under foreign rule have been referred to as its "400-year-long night." Bergen had been its major port and city during the Hanseatic era, until the plague is believed to have arrived there first and then spread around the country. Oslo, meanwhile, was also a major settlement with roots back to Viking times, and is where Norway's historic fortress and royal residence Akershus was built at

the top of the Oslo Fjord, still a direct sail north from Copenhagen.

The Danish rule that eventually gripped Norway was firmly controlled from Copenhagen, when Denmark was also often at war with Sweden. Oslo became especially important for exports of everything from cobalt to granite and timber to Denmark.

It continued to be called Oslo through the Middle Ages until 1624. That's when King Christian IV, one of Denmark's many rulers over Norway, decreed that the original city be rebuilt directly behind behind Akershus after another devastating fire, and named after him. Oslo thus became "Christiania" and remained so well into the 1800s. That's when Oslo residents and officials began to spell it with a "K" that was considered more Norwegian.

Debate over the capital's name arose in earnest during the late 1800s, when historian PA Munch claimed that "Oslo" was the city's most natural and historic name. Many Norwegians who had moved from rural areas of Norway to the capital in search of better jobs seized on the idea, viewing "Oslo" as better reflecting Norway's long history than "Kristiania" did.

The capital's own longtime residents, though, wanted to retain the name of the city where they were born as "Kristiania." Historian Kirsti Gulowsen, in charge of Oslo's city archives, wrote in newspaper *Dagsavisen* this week that they thought "Oslo" was "perhaps too short, snobbish and strange." Oslo, Gulowsen noted, was also already the name of the oldest neighbourhood within the capital, now known as *Gamlebyen*, literally "the old city."

When the capital faced its 300th anniversary as Christiania/Kristiania in 1924, the name issue came to a head amidst plans for a jubilee. The city council, aware that any name change had to be verified by state law, thought debate had flown for long enough. The vote ended in a tie. When the issue was decided upon in Parliament in June 2024, those favouring "Oslo" ultimately won over more conservative votes.

The name change took effect from January 1, 1925. There was no lavish jubilee for the capital during the course of 1924, but various historic events were held, also last year when the city celebrated its past 400 years.

City officials have paid more attention in recent years to the city's thousand-year celebrations held in 2000. An exact founding date for Oslo hs never been established, but archaeologists date settlements and English convents to well before 1000, the first marketplace, homes and church to the late 900s and the first royal compound (kongsgården) in Oslo to the reign of Harald Hardråde around 1048.
