FROM THE 3RD DISTRICT



Fra 3D President, Steve Helmold, May 2024 - Recently, Karen and I attended the Third District Picnic chaired by Sports and Recreational Director Paul Kornbrekke. When Paul approached the board stating that he wished to bring back the 3D sports picnic, the board happily gave him the go-ahead. The hard work of Paul and his committee, mainly the members of Nansen Lodge, paid off as the picnic was a great

success. I am hoping that it will be even bigger and better next year! A big **THANK YOU** goes to Paul et al.

As I write this message, the time for Third District Convention is quickly approaching and will be here before we know it. Then the summer months arrive when the district lodges take time off from meetings to have their picnics and get togethers. This is also a time when members travel or just stay home and enjoy the summer.

With that said, it was very disheartening when I, along with other district board members were notified from International Board Chairman Ron Stubbings that our dues will be drastically raised starting July 1st.

In 2021 the international board put out a referendum to go to a board governance format which most of the Third District delegates from the 2018 International Convention strongly opposed and voted "no", but it passed anyway. Since Sons of Norway went to a board governance format and stopped having international conventions with delegates to represent the members of Sons of Norway, we the members have lost our say in our organization. Just as in colonial times in America where England was taxing the colonists, where it was taxation without representation, we have the same problem not having international convention delegates to represent us. So, we have dues increases without representation. The international board has all the power, we do not have control anymore. We have no say in our own organization. Those who voted to give the International Board of Directors this power did so in good faith. We can only ask, "is the International Board of Directors governing with the same good faith?"

I want the members of the Third District to know that the change in dues was made solely by the International Board of Directors without any input from district presidents or other district leaders. Everyone to whom I have spoken about this agrees that it will lead to a major decrease in membership and could backfire on the International Board of Directors by bringing less revenue overall to the home office.

The fraternal leg of our beloved "3-legged stool" has taken and continues to take the brunt of the shortcomings of the "insurance leg."

Just during my term of office which began in June of 2022, we have seen the following changes:

- > The number of issues of the Viking Magazine decreased from 12 to 6 issues a year.
- > The amount of dues received by districts was drastically reduced. In District 3 we had a 73% decrease from 2021 to 2023.
- > Our district convention is not being supported this year as it has been in the past; no longer does the home office supply tote bags, pads, pens, booklets explaining Parliamentary Procedures and this is the last year that they will supply ballots, instead they sent a template for districts to print and cut-up on their own. They are also not paying for any representatives from the home office to attend district conventions.
- > They are no longer supplying plaques for lodges that reach important milestones such as 50, 75, 100-year anniversaries.
- > The recruitment event kits are no longer available from the home office. This box of goodies had signs, applications, and many types of informational handouts for all three legs of our stool: fraternal, foundation and insurance. This forced districts and lodges to develop and pay for their own information to distribute.
- > Just prior to my term of office, the International Board of Directors did away with the Founders Award. Soon after raising the threshold for a lodge to win this award from a 3% increase in membership to a 10% increase in membership, they stopped awarding anything. The award was a nice recognition with a small monetary award for lodges that recruited new members.

One might question their ultimate plan for fraternal. Do they want to do away with the fraternal leg of our stool all together? We must work hard to keep the "fraternal" in Sons of Norway by recruiting more new members and by having more programs at lodge meetings, so members do not mind paying the dues increase. The Third District Revitalization Committee is here to help you do just that! There is a lot of helpful information from the committee on the Third District Website.

I hope to see many of you at our convention. Due to the Convention, there will be no president's message in June. My next message will be in September. Have a great summer.

Some Cultural Items for the Month

Cultural Cornor: Bjørnstjerne Bjørnson - poet

and writer - part 2 - The first children's parade: Marking special days or festivals with celebrations involving parades with banners, music and singing was common in the past. A school headmaster, Peter Qvam, is thought to have come up with the idea of holding the first children's parade in Norway in 1869. Qvam was a friend of the author Bjørnstjerne Bjørnson. Both argued keenly in favor of



organizing a children's parade to celebrate Constitution Day. The following year, in 1870, the first children's parade marched to the Palace, stopping to sing the royal anthem beneath the Palace balcony. It was primarily the famous

writers Henrik Wergeland and Bjørnstjerne Bjørnson who made *syttende mai* a real national day in ever-widening circles of the Norwegian people. It was through the latter's initiative that the first *barnetoget* (children's train or procession) came to be in 1870. Bjørnson's friend, school principal Peter Qvam, had organized a children's train at his school the year before. What was first called *Smaagutternes Flagtog* (the small boys' flag procession), brought together 1,800–2,000 schoolboys and started one of the most important 17th of May traditions in Norway. While the so-called *borgertoget* (citizens' train or procession) has become less and less important, the children's train has become the central feature of the 17th of May celebrations in both rural and urban areas.

During World War II, it was forbidden to participate in the 17th of May parade or to wear the colors of the Norwegian flag on your clothes. Upon liberation on the 8th of May 1945, the flag therefore became an extra strong symbol of Norway's freedom.

The parade, or *syttende mai-toget*, is a highlight of the day's celebrations. The parade features schoolchildren, marching bands, and local organizations, all dressed in their best attire. The parade typically starts in the morning and makes its way through the city or town, with spectators lining the streets to watch and cheer. Only boys, some 1,200 in all and most of them from Qvam's school in Christiania, took part in the first children's parade. It was not until 1889 that girls, pupils from Mrs Ragna Nielsen's school, were allowed to join the parade. Møllergata school was the first school to have its own band in 1902. The current celebration of the graduates-to-be from upper secondary school dates back to 1905, when the graduating class took part in the May 17th parade for the first time.

Collaborations with Grieg: In the 1870's Bjørnson and the composer Edvard Grieg, who shared his interests in Norwegian self-



government, became friends. Grieg set several of his poems to music, including *Landkjenning* and *Sigurd Jorsalfar*. Eventually they decided on an opera based on *King Olav Trygvason*, but a dispute as to whether music or lyrics should be created first led to Grieg being

diverted to working on incidental music for Henrik Ibsen's play Peer Gynt, which naturally offended Bjørnson. Eventually their friendship was resumed. The "national poet" is the picture to your left of Bjørnstjerne Bjørnson and Karoline Bjørnson at Aulestad Bjørnson settled on his estate of Aulestad in Gausdal. In 1877 he published another novel, Magnhild, in which his ideas on social questions were seen to be in a state of fermentation, and gave expression to his republican sentiments in the polemical play Kongen (The King). In a later edition of the play, he prefixed an essay on "Intellectual Freedom" in further explanation of his position. Kaptejn Mansana (Captain Mansana), an episode of the war of Italian independence. Extremely anxious to obtain full success on the stage, Bjørnson concentrated his powers on a drama of social life, Leonarda (1879), which raised a violent controversy. A satirical play, Det nye System (The New System), was produced a few weeks later. Although these plays of Bjørnson's second period were greatly discussed, few were financially successful. Bjørnson produced a social drama, En Handske (A Gauntlet), in 1883, but was unable to persuade any manager to stage it except in a modified form. In the autumn of the same year, Bjørnson published a mystical or symbolic drama, Over Ævne, dealing with the abnormal features of religious excitement with extraordinary force; this was not acted until 1899, when it achieved a success.

Bjørnson had done as much as any other man to rouse Norwegian nationalistic feeling, but in 1903, on the verge of the rupture between Norway and Sweden, he preached conciliation and moderation to the Norwegians. However, in 1905 he largely remained silent.



When Norway was attempting to dissolve the forced union with Sweden, Bjørnson sent a telegram to the Norwegian Prime Minister Michelsen stating, "Now is the time to unite." The minister replied, "Now is the time to shut up." This was in fact a satirical illustration published in *Vikingen*, but the story got so popular and widespread that Bjørnson had to deny it, claiming that "Michelsen has never asked me to shut up; it would not help if he did".

He died on 26 April 1910 in Paris, where for some years he had spent his winters, and was buried at home with every mark of honor. The Norwegian coastal defense ship HNoMS *Norge* was sent to convey

his remains back to his own land.

History Article: The Battle of Hastings: -- part 2

Norman soldiers: Battle of Hastings on 14th October 1066



The Normans and the other Frankish contingents in William's army fought in the manner developing across mainland Europe, a mix of archers, dismounted soldiers and above all mounted knights.

The soldiers on either side who could afford it wore leather jackets with steel chain or ring mail sewn into the leather and a conical helmet with a nose guard, carrying a spear, sword and the characteristic kite shaped shield. Archers in the Norman army were armed with a short bow.

The significant features of the battle were the maneuverability of the Norman mounted knights, the terrible power of the Saxon battle axe and the impact of the Norman arrow barrage.

Account of the Battle of Hastings: William, Duke of Normandy, launched his bloody and decisive invasion of Saxon England in 1066. In that year Edward the Confessor, King of England, died without heir, appointing by his will

Harold Godwinsson, son of England's most powerful nobleman, the Earl of Wessex, as his successor. Across the Channel, William of Normandy considered himself rightfully the next King of England, basing his claim on a promise by Edward the Confessor in the early 1050s and an oath of fealty sworn by Harold during an enforced visit to William's capital at Rouen following his capture by the Count of Ponthieu.

Succeeding to the dukedom of Normandy as a bastard child of Duke Robert, William devoted his early adult life to enforcing his authority in a succession of ruthless campaigns, meanwhile building his dukedom into a fearsome mini-state, efficient both administratively and militarily.

In the summer of 1066 William assembled an army of noblemen and adventurers from across Northern France to invade England, promising lands and titles in his new kingdom to his followers and obtaining the support of the Pope for the venture.

EVERYDAY HISTORY FACTS

Each week, whether we know it or not, we pay a small tribute to several gods from the ancient Norse pantheon. In fact, four days of the week are named after deities from Norse mythology. Tuesday comes from Tyr, the Norse god of war, while Wednesday is named after Odin, a powerful deity who was the father of many other Norse gods and ruled over Valhalla, the hall of slain warriors (the name is derived from the Anglo-Saxon word "Wodnesdaeg," meaning "Woden's day"). Thursday's namesake is Thor, the Norse god of Thunder, and Friday is named for Frigg, the wife of Odin and the Norse goddess of marriage and fertility.

The presence of Norse mythology in our days of the week is due to the historical connection between the English and Old Norse languages. In the eighth century CE, the British Isles were invaded by Viking tribes from Denmark, Norway, and Sweden, all of whom spoke Old Norse. As a result, many words in the English language are descended from Old Norse. The Vikings adopted the Roman custom of naming the days of the week after gods, but replaced the Latin deities with gods from their own mythology. The Old Norse names of Tyr, Odin, Thor, and Frigg evolved over time to

become the weekdays we use in modern English today
