The Legend of Queen Dagmar (My favorite all time Monarch) (From the TDT 3rdQ)



The beloved Queen Dagmar (softly pronounced as Dow-mer with the ac-cent on the first syllable) was born a princess in Bohemia and became the wife of thirteenth-century ruler King Valdemar the Victorious.

In 1205, Dagmar sailed to Ribe from Meissen to marry the Danish King. According to tradition, the day after the wedding, Dagmar received a morning present from Valdemar, but she had not wanted jewelry or other riches. Instead she wanted all prisoners in Valdemar's prisons released and the high taxes for farmers to be lowered. Valdemar granted both her wishes and Dagmar quickly became a beloved Queen of the people.

Dagmar of Bohemia (also known as **Margaret**, Czech: *Markéta*; c. 1186 – 24 May 1212 in Ribe) was Queen of Denmark as the first spouse of King Valdemar II. She was the daughter of King Ottokar I of Bohemia and his first wife, Adelaide of Meissen.

Margaret's father, Ottokar I, became Duke of Bohemia in 1192, but in 1193 was deposed. He then left Bohemia with his family. His wife, Adelaide, and their children found a new home at the court of her brother Albert I, Margrave of Meissen. Ottokar became a mercenary for German rulers. In 1197, Ottokar became the Duke of Bohe-mia for a second time. He repudiated Adelaide and divorced her in 1199 on the grounds of consanguinity. He married Constance of Hungary later the same year. This step, together with other maneuvers, helped him later to obtain the hereditary elevation of his title to king.

Adelaide did not waive her rights. In 1205, she returned to Prague temporarily. At that time, Ottokar de-cided to marry their daughter, Margaret, to Valdemar II of Denmark. His new wife Constance gave birth to a son, later King Wenceslaus I of Bohemia, the same year. Adelaide left Bohemia soon and died a few years later.

Before his first marriage, Valdemar had been betrothed to Richeza of Bavaria, daughter of the Duke of Saxony. When that engagement fell through, he married Margaret, now known as Dagmar, in 1205 at Lübeck. According to the records of Annales Ryenses (*Rydårbogen*), in 1206 Queen Dagmar influenced Valdemar to release one of his most fervent enemies, Valdemar, Bishop of Schleswig, who had been held in captivity since 1193.

In 1209, Queen Dagmar gave birth to Valdemar the Young (c. 1209–1231). Queen Dagmar died on 24 May 1212 while giving birth to her second son, who did not survive. She was just 23 years old. She was buried in Ringsted in St. Bendt's Church. Valdemar II elevated Valde-mar the Young as co-king at Schleswig in 1218. However, Valdemar was accidentally shot with an arrow while hunting at Refsnæs in North Jut-land during 1231. Not many things are known about Dagmar as a person. Most of the im

age of Dagmar comes from later folksongs, myths and legends, designed to present her as an ideal Chris-tian queen; mild, patient and universally loved, in contrast to her unpopular successor, Queen Berengaria. Old folk ballads say that on her deathbed she begged Valdemar to marry Kirsten, the daughter of Karl von Rise, and not the "beautiful flower" Berengária of Portugal. In other words, she predicted a struggle for the Danish throne between the sons of Berengaria.

After Dagmar's death, in order to build good relations with Flanders (a commercially important territory to the west of Denmark's hostile southern neighbours), Valdemar married Berengária of Portugal in 1214. Queen Dagmar is buried in St. Bendt's Church in Ringsted, on one side of Valdemar II, with Queen Ber-engária buried on the other side of the King.



In 1690, when her gravesite was removed to make way for the tomb of Erik VI (Menved) and his Queen Ingeborg, a small gold cross with detailed enamel work was found on the breast of Queen Dagmar.

In 1695 the cross was donated to the National Gallery of Denmark. The jewel of Byzantine design and workmanship, is of gold, enamelled, having on one side a cru-cifix, and on the other side portraits of Christ in the center, St Basil, St John Chrysos-tom, Mary the Virgin and St John the Apostle-Evangelist. In 1863, King Frederik VII of Denmark donated a replica of the cross to Princess Alexandra of Denmark, daughter of the later King Christian IX of Denmark when she married the Prince of Wales, later King Edward VII of England.

In the modern era, the Dagmar Cross "is worn by Danish girls for their confirmation into the Lutheran Church, and is also given to children as a baptismal gift." In the Lutheran Church of Sweden, "the cross is now delivered to the new bishop, on his installation in office, by the Archbishop of Uppsala, together with the mitre and crozier."

Some Cultural Items for the Month

Cultural Connor: 2018 There Dutch Vikings?

Part1 I watched a webinar presented by Victoria Hofma and she mentioned there were Vikings in Holland. It intrigued me. I did some research and this article was easy to read and fun to learn. I hope you enjoy this 2 part series.

DUTCH VIKINGS: The world may not know much about Vikings, but it hasn't stopped us from speculating about them. We do know that they were seafaring people who originated from Europe and were the first people from the continent to



reach North America. They were expert sailors who traveled as far as North Africa, the Middle East, and the Mediterranean.

However, the world does not know much about the descendants of the Vikings. Questions like were there **Dutch Vikings** and which country in Europe has Viking descendants are still being asked by students of history. Although it is impossible to know where every last descendant of the Vikings is, we can conduct some studies to learn more about the genetic makeup of the population of different countries. France, Spain, and Italy remained relatively safe from the raids of the Vikings. But England and its islands became a popular spot for Viking

THE LANGUAGE DUTCH: The official language of the Netherlands is Dutch. It is also spoken in the Flanders, in Belgium. In Flemish cities, other languages are also spoken by the locals. West Frisian is a secondary official language in the province of Friesland in the Netherlands. In the Caribbean Netherlands, English and Papiamento act as secondary official languages. Afrikaans is the daughter language of Dutch and is one of the official languages of South Africa. It was brought to South Africa by Dutch settlers during the 18th century.

For centuries, the Netherlands remained under foreign control. At first, it was the barbaric Germanic tribes that ruled over Frisia, and then came the Romans. France and Spain also ruled over Frisia for different periods of time. Once the Dutch got their independence, they started working on improving their country. But during World War II, the Netherlands came under attack from Germany.

DUTCH POPULATION: It is impossible to know the genetic makeup of the people living in all provinces of the Netherlands. We also cannot test all the people of Amsterdam. A study of this scale cannot be conducted. However, more than twenty percent of the population can be tested. The Netherlands is not the first country in Europe you think of when someone mentions Vikings. It is Denmark, Sweden, and Norway that is located in northern Europe and share the closest ties to the Vikings and maybe to the Dutch Vikings. However, the Vikings did settle down in different regions, including the Netherlands, so it should be of no surprise to anyone if there are any Viking descendants in Frisia so the Dutch Vikings.

THE INFLUENCE OF EUROPEAN COUNTRIES ON DUTCH CULTURE: France, Spain, and Germanic tribes ruled over Frisia in the past. But over time, the people of Frisia were able to gain control over their territory. Once France, Spain, and tribes were all kicked out, the Netherlands had a chance to grow on its own. Although Norway, Germany, Spain, and France are all in Europe and have good relationships with the Netherlands, they don't have any influence over the Dutch culture.

Amsterdam is not the only city in modern-day Frisia with its own vibrant life. Every city in the Netherlands has its own stories to tell. A single article cannot tell the story of Amsterdam or the whole of North Holland. History Article: The Kon-Tiki Expedition

The Voyage: The Kon-Tiki left Callao, Peru on the afternoon of April 28, 1947. It was initially towed 50 miles out to open water by the Fleet Tug Guardian Rios of the Peruvian Navy. She then sailed roughly west carried along on the Humboldt Current. The team's first sight of land was



the atoll of Puka-Puka on July 30. They made brief contact with the inhabitants of Angatau Island on August 4, but were unable to land safely. Three days later, on August 7, the raft struck a reef and was eventually beached on an uninhabited islet off Raroia Island in the Tuamotu group.

They had traveled a distance of around 3,770 nautical miles in 101 days, at an average speed of 1.5 knots. \leftarrow *The Kon-Tiki on the open ocean.* **Stores:** The Kon-Tiki carried 66 gallons of water in bamboo tubes. For food they took two hundred coconuts, sweet potatoes, bottle gourds, and other assorted fruit and roots. The U.S. Army Quartermaster Corps provided field rations, tinned food, and survival equipment. In return, the Kon-Tiki explorers reported on the quality and utility of the provisions. They also caught plentiful numbers of fish, particularly flying fish, mahimahi, vellowfin tuna, and shark.

Crew: The Kon-Tiki was crewed by six men, all Norwegian except for Bengt Danielsson, who's from Sweden. *The crew of the Kon-Tiki*.



Thor Heyerdahl, shown here: was the expedition leader.

Erik Hesselberg was the navigator and artist. He painted the large Kon-Tiki figure on the raft's sail. Bengt Danielsson took on the role of steward, in charge of supplies and daily rations. Danielsson was a sociologist interested in human migration theory. He also served as translator, as he was the only member of the crew who spoke Spanish. Knut Haugland was a radio expert, decorated by the British in World War II for actions in the Norwegian heavy-water sabotage that stalled Germany's plans to develop an atomic bomb. Torstein Raaby was also in charge of radio transmissions. He gained radio experience while hiding behind German lines during WWII, spying on the German battleship Tirpitz. His secret radio transmissions eventually helped guide in Allied bombers to sink the ship. Herman Watzinger was an engineer whose area of expertise was in technical measurements. He recorded meteorological and hydrographical data while underway.

Communications: you needed to transmit who you were and where you were from as well as information that the different country required. Call Sign: LI2B / Receiver: National NC-173 / Transmitter: unknown / As an emergency backup they also carried a British Mark II transceiver originally produced by the SOE in 1942.

Marine Life Encountered: The Kon-Tiki explorers discovered the legendary snake-mackerel (latin name Gempylus) and had a rare sighting of the whale shark. Heyerdahl had experiences with two specimens of the snake-mackerel, a fish which had never previously been seen alive by man, when they jumped aboard from out of the deep. The first was at night, when the snake-mackerel was washed into Torstein Raaby's sleeping bag; the second was also at night, when the Gempylus tried to attack the lantern.

Pressure rises to phase out Norway's oil oct 30,2023

Climate- and environmental advocates in Norway finally have something to

cheer about, after a state commission concluded that the Norwegian government must launch a strategy to phase out oil and gas production as quickly as possible. The commission also recommends halting all licensing for new oil expiration. In the meantime, along with restricting more production or construction of new production plants until such a strategy is in place.

Reining in the oil industry and developing renewable

energy sources instead is, according to the commission, the only way Norway can hope to meet the climate goals it has set for itself: Carbon emissions that are 90-95 percent lower in 2050 than they were in 1990.

"In a low-emission society just about all emissions have to be removed for good," said commission leader Martin Skancke when presenting its report just before the weekend. "Policies must have that as a starting point. The question isn't whether emissions shall be reduced, but which small emissions will be allowed to remain in 2050. Everything else has to be eliminated."

The policies of all Norwegian governments since the start of Norway's oil age have instead been, and remain, just the opposite. Both Labour- and Conservatives-led government coalitions have consistently supported and promoted Norway's oil and gas industry over the years, because of all the jobs it creates and how much money it generates for the economy.

The current Labour-Center government even still stands behind its strategy to "*utvikle, ikke avvikle*" (develop, not phase out) the oil and gas industry, defying both the United Nations and the International Energy Agency (IEA), which claim the world already has more oil and gas than can ever be used if climate goals are to be met. Norway's international reputation has been suffering because of its refusal to stop searching for more oil and gas, even in sensitive Arctic areas, and top Norwegian politicians weren't invited to speak at a climate conference at last ment's graving of the UN Canard Assambly.

month's opening of the UN General Assembly.

It remains to be seen which of the many sides in this debate will win out. However, is Norway taking the lead in making the tough choices needed to meet this objective? Time will tell!

Norwegian cheese 'best in the world'

October 2023 - Norway's cheese industry, long dominated by a state regulated dairy cooperative, has diversified and blossomed in recent years through small private initiative. It's also attracted lots of international attention, first winning an earlier world champion-ship held in Spain in 2016 when *Kraftkar* was singled out as the world's best cheese. In 2018 *Fanaosten* from Vestlandet won at the World Cheese Awards held that year in Bergen.

Now a handmade semi-solid blue cheese called *Nidelven Blå* has won based on judging by 264 cheese experts from 38 countries at this year's event held in Trondheim. "This means so much to us," said Maren Gangstadt, general manager of cheesemaker Gangstadt Gårdsysteri located at Inderøy in Trøndelag, not far from Trondheim.

Now it has won top honours, with Irish judge Finbar Deery praising its "interplay between the mild and blue flavours" and claiming that it has "a creamy dense fudginess." A total of 4,502 cheeses entered in the championships from 43 countries were whittled down to 100 so-called "Super Gold" awards, from which 16 finalists were put forward for re-judging by an international jury to determine the World Champion Cheese for 2023.

Norwegians seek more unique names

A new trend is sweeping over Norway, fueled by some Norwegians' desire to have more unique names. They're tired of being one of thousands of Hansens, Olsens, Andersens or other last names ending in "-sen," and they're legally changing them.

"It was very boring to be called 'Andersen," Sten Morten Misund-Asphaug told newspaper *Dagsavisen*. It carried a sixpage story over the weekend about how Misund-Asphaug and many others like him have opted to rename themselves. He ended up taking on the name of his wife's family farm: "Misund-Asphaug" simply seemed more special, even exotic, and he's far from alone on literally and legally rebranding himself.

"The common '-sen' names are falling like a rock," confirms Ivar Utne, a language researcher at the University of Bergen and author of the book *Hva er et navn? (What is a name?)*. He told *Dagsavisen* that only 14.5 percent of newborns in Norway now get a name ending in "sen," down from 30 percent of today's 90-year-olds. Utne added that at the beginning of the 1900s, at least half of all Norwegians had a "sen" name in Norway's cities, 60- to 70 percent in Oslo (called "Kristiania" at the time).

In some cases, Norwegians have more unusual "-sen" names, like *Enevoldsen* or *Barosen*, especially if they come from Northern Norway. Many young urban Johansens, Karlsens and Jensens, though, are returning to the rural custom of taking on the name of the farm or village where their family originated. They're tired of being one of 35,000 Andersens or Larsens in Norway and want a special, common name for their own family. Since most women in Norway no longer take on their husband's last name when they marry, couples and their children can also often wind up with different names.
