VESTERHEIM

Emigration Anniversary Tour to Norway Tour Leader: Rolf Svanoe June 24 – July 5, 2025

Commemorate the 200th Anniversary of the first organized emigration of Norwegians to the United States with Vesterheim in 2025! The single masted sloop, *Restauration*, left Stavanger on July 4, 1825, with 52 people on board. Often referred to as the "Sloopers," they arrived in New York City harbor on October 9. Two hundred years later, a replica of that ship is going to recreate their journey.

Join Vesterheim leader Rolf Svanoe along with expert local Norwegian guides for this tour through the fascinating history of Norway during the 1800s. We'll begin in Oslo with a brief city tour and a visit to the Norsk Folkemuseum. We will also visit the Amerikalinjen Hotel, which was once the headquarters of the Amerikalinjen shipping company where many Norwegian emigrants began their trip to America with hopes for a better life. Next, we visit the Norwegian Emigration Museum in Ottestad, the only museum and research center in Norway fully dedicated to Norwegian emigration history.

Then we travel south to the Herregården in Larvik, the former home to one of Decorah's most famous historical people, Elisabeth Koren. Her father was headmaster of the school in Larvik when she and her husband, Rev. U. V. Koren, emigrated. After an overnight in Kristiansand, we drive to Norway's southernmost point for a tour of the Lindesnes Lighthouse. Then it's on to Lista with its strong connection to the United States. We will attend the American Festival Parade held every year in Vanse, and make a brief visit to the American Emigration Museum in Kvinesdal.

Our tour takes us along Norway's west coast to the Utstein Monastery Hotel and home of the replica of the *Restauration* ship. We will meet with the Friends of the Restauration Association and also the Tysvær and Avaldsnes History Association.

On July 4, we will join the celebrations in Stavanger as we watch the replica of the *Restauration* sail away on its recreation of the journey 200 years ago. The tour ends the following day with our hearts full of wonderful memories from our travels in Norway. TWO DECADES LATER, THE ENDURING LEGACY OF 9/11

We watched in horror as the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, left nearly 3,000 people dead. Nearly 20 years later, we remember the nation's military mission in Afghanistan which lost many American lives Every year we see the ceremonies in Downtown Manhattan. .The enduring power of the Sept. 11 attacks is clear: An

overwhelming share of Americans who are old enough to recall the day remember where they were and what they were doing when they heard the news. Yet an ever-growing number of Americans have no personal memory of that day, either because they were too young or not yet born.

A review of U.S. public opinion in the two decades since 9/11 reveals how a badly shaken nation came together, briefly, in a spirit of sadness and patriotism; how the public initially rallied behind the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq, though support waned over time; and how Americans viewed the threat of terrorism at home and the steps the government took to combat it. As the country comes to grips with the tumultuous exit of U.S. military forces from Afghanistan, the departure has raised long-term questions about U.S. foreign policy and America's place in the world. Yet the public's initial judgments on that mission are clear: A majority endorses the decision to withdraw from Afghanistan.

Never the less we cannot forget the date that demonstrated our vulnerabilities to the evil the worls has to offer and we came together.

<u>**Cultural Corner:</u>** A Norwegian Dad Hiking with His Family Discovered a Rock Face Covered with Bronze Age Paintings</u>

It's the first time this type of painting has been found regionally. Rock paintings have never before been found in

Bronze Age paintings.

The discovery did not, however, come as a complete surprise to Tormod Fjeld, a graphic designer and devoted amateur archaeologist who has hunted down more than <u>500</u> petroglyphs with friends in recent years.

And so, when Fjeld spotted a nearby boulder with unusual coloration while taking a break from hiking, he was ready. Fjeld pulled out his phone, took a picture, and then plugged it into an app that could clarify if the markings were natural pigments, such as iron deposits, or something altogether more interesting.

Once a scene of human figures and animals came into view, he promptly called Jone Kile-Vesik, the local archaeologist, with whom Field has collaborated

many times previously.

"We were enjoying a little snack of juice and biscuits on a Sunday when I saw something red on the rock," Fjeld said in an interview with the

Norwegian Institute for Cultural Heritage Research (NIKU). "I took a picture and went into the app. I had something like an out-of-body experience. I didn't really think it could be anything."

Kile-Vesik called in a team from NIKU to inspect the rocks and they quickly confirmed Fjeld's latest find. The paintings, which include depictions of rowers and standing human figures, are the first to have been found in the coastal area of Østfold and Viken—though the precise location is, for now, being kept a secret to protect them, given contact can quite

"They are extremely hard to find due to the faintness of the paint,"

NIKU's Jan Magne Gjerde told Artnet News. "Not many people have been looking for them, which is why not many have been found, though we are sure there are more paintings." It's the first time that this type of painting has been found in southern Norway and based on the motifs and style researchers believe they were made during the Bronze Age, though the Iron Age remains a possibility.

American dies in Viking voyage sinking off Norway August 28, 2024



The Naddoddur set off from the Faroe Islands on Aug 24 on a trip of about 400 nautical miles.

An American woman has died after the replica boat she was in capsized in in rough seas during an expedition from the Faroe Islands to Norway.

Six people were on board the Naddoddur when it got into trouble on Tuesday evening, on the fourth day of the trip, and a distress signal was sent.- Only five people managed to get into an inflatable life raft. They were later airlifted to safety by helicopter. - A woman's body was eventually found on Wednesday morning not far from where the boat sank. -Norway's Sea Rescue Society (NSSR) described conditions west of the town of Stad at the time as very

demanding, posting a video of the strong winds and high sea. https://x.com/NSSR/status/1828529982056054803

It said waves were up to 5m (16ft) and winds were as much as 40 knots. - Bergur Jacobsen, who is chairman of the Naddoddur boat club on the Faroe Islands, told the BBC that everyone was very sad about what had happened. - He explained that the 10m-long boat had been on previous Viking voyages before to Iceland, Shetland and Norway. -"It's not a Viking boat, it's a Faroes fishing boat without a motor but with sails." - He said he could not speak about the accident as a Norwegian investigation team was due to speak to him. - Locals were said to be in shock at what happened. One seaman told the BBC that visitors were keen to go on expeditions with the boat, although he would not have done so himself. - The expedition had been postponed for several days because of bad weather until Saturday. - One of four Swiss nationals on the trip, Andy Fitze, posted a map on social media two days into the voyage showing the boat to the north-east of Shetland. - Before the trip, the Faroese member of the crew, Livar Nysted, said when you were in the middle of a storm "you just try to do the best you can". "It's an open boat. You sleep under the stars and when it's raining or windy you can feel the elements."
