Kristine indicated she would look into these thoughts and perhaps get the Zone involved in helping with subsidizing expenses for attendees. **Zone:** A Zone meeting had just been held the past Wednesday – Both Barbara & Karen have Raffle Tickets to support the Scholarship Fund. 3rd District: Karen stated: (1) October is SOFN Foundation Month (2) All resolutions at the 3rd District Convention were pasted. BUT they were denied by the IBoD. They may look into offering insurance education to members electronically (3) 3rd Dist meeting was this past Saturday, resulting in many committees set ups. (4) Steve indicated that plans for some great events are forthcoming (flyers will be in the Newsletter) (5) Youth Camp is July 20-26 at Koinonia. (6) 3rd Dist Picnic at Nansen Park on Aug 23,2025. \$50 Cost includes all food & games. Help is needed, if you can pitch in contact Karen or Ruth Kornbrekke know. (7) IBoD (Internation Board of Directors)has now started taking the dues directly from the district The \$2,500 which was part of the settlement is half of the money that Gateway Lodge owes the District from the loan they borrowed & did not pay back to the district following the Convention. The Lodge does not understand that the loan not being paid is now costing the district an additional \$2,500 over the \$5,000 that Gateway borrowed & has not paid back. Costing the District more than they lent.

Personal note: Barbara B is very disappointed that the IBoD is not holding Gateway to Florida Lodge accountable for the loan granted from the District to help with preconvention expenses, to Gateway Lodge in good faith. Where is this fair to the District? Where is this the IBoD thoughts? Where is their fraternalism? Are they following their own policies and bylaws?

Emigration Anniversary Tour to Norway Tour Leader: Rolf Svanoe June 24 – July 5, <u>2025</u>

Commemorate the 200th Anniversary of the first organized emigration of Norwegians to the United States with Vesterheim in 2025! The single masted sloop, *Restauration*, left Stavanger on July 4, 1825, with 52 people on board. Often referred to as the "Sloopers," they arrived in New York City harbor on October 9. Two hundred years later, a replica of that ship is going to recreate their journey.

Join Vesterheim leader Rolf Svanoe along with expert local Norwegian guides for this tour through the fascinating history of Norway during the 1800s. We'll begin in Oslo with a brief city tour and a visit to the Norsk Folkemuseum. We will also visit the Amerikalinjen Hotel, which was once the headquarters of the Amerikalinjen shipping company where many Norwegian emigrants began their trip to America with hopes for a better life. Next, we visit the Norwegian Emigration Museum in Ottestad, the only museum and research center in Norway fully dedicated to Norwegian emigration history.

Then we travel south to the Herregården in Larvik, the former home to one of Decorah's most famous historical people, Elisabeth Koren. Her father was headmaster of the school in Larvik when she and her husband, Rev. U. V. Koren, emigrated. After an overnight in Kristiansand, we drive to Norway's southernmost point for a tour of the Lindesnes Lighthouse. Then it's on to Lista with its strong connection to the United States. We will attend the American Festival Parade held every year in Vanse, and make a brief visit to the American Emigration Museum in Kvinesdal.

Our tour takes us along Norway's west coast to the Utstein Monastery Hotel and home of the replica of the *Restauration* ship. We will meet with the Friends of the Restauration Association and also the Tysvær and Avaldsnes History Association.

On July 4, we will join the celebrations in Stavanger as we watch the replica of the *Restauration* sail away on its recreation of the journey 200 years ago. The tour ends the following day with our hearts full of wonderful memories from our travels in Norway. The True Story Behind the First Thanksgiving For the Pilgrims and Native Americans, it wasn't all peace and harmony.

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Thanksgiving: Time to dive face-first into mountains of mashed potatoes, <u>count</u> <u>our blessings</u> and if we're feeling really ambitious, get up a friendly game of toss the pigskin with the cousins (or watch our favorite team do the same). But before we all descend into food comas, it's important to reflect on the **real history of Thanksgiving** — and the first one wasn't all peace, love and pass the gravy. While the settlers at Plymouth and their allies from the Wampanoag tribe really did get together in 1621 for a table-groaning, three-day feast to celebrate the settlers' first harvest, that's far from the whole story.

In elementary school, most of us probably learned that English religious exiles began establishing civilization in what they called "the new world," winning over the local Indigenous people already living there with promises of friendship. Then, the Native Americans taught the new arrivals how to grow crops to sustain their growing society and everybody lived happily ever after. Well, not quite. The real story is far more complicated, not to mention a lot less kid-friendly.

In reality, the peace that brought the Wampanoag and the settlers together at that historic table wasn't as easy to come by as we'd like to believe. A lot of bloodshed took place both before and after that first feast, and mistreatment of Native Americans continues to this day. That's why many Native Americans and others mark Thanksgiving as a solemn day of remembrance instead of celebration.- If you're cooking for a crowd this year, take comfort in the fact that more than 100 people were in attendance that first Thanksgiving – and they didn't even have running water, never mind a dishwasher. At least 90 Native men and 50 Englishmen came to the feast, **Plimoth Plantation** colonial foodways culinary expert Kathleen Wall **told** *Time*. The Native people dined sitting on the ground, like they did at home, and the English ate at the table, like they did at theirs. - The group likely played marksmanship games and ran footraces in between dining on venison, geese, turkey and other fowl. The festivities lasted three days, since it took the Wampanoag a solid two to walk there. So yes, overnight holiday guests are deeply rooted in Thanksgiving tradition.

The Wampanoag leader brokered peace A Wampanoag leader named Massasoit first <u>negotiated a treaty</u> between the Plymouth settlers and the Wampanoag tribe in 1620, which included an agreement that no member of either group would harm anyone from the other. They also pledged to leave their weapons at home when trading, to further ensure peaceful commerce. For about 10 years, Massasoit and the Pilgrims remained allies, trading English goods for Wampanoag land, access to natural resources and other assets.

But after Massasoit passed away in 1661 and his son Wamsutta took over, tensions began to simmer. In the years between 1630–1642 alone, about 25,000 European colonizers arrived, while a devastating plague decimated the Native population by more than half. Wamsutta himself died mysteriously in 1662 while visiting the Puritans to talk over gathering unrest between the two groups, <u>Atlas Obscura reports</u>. His successor, Metacomet, only fanned the flames.

Violating a treaty led to bloodshed In 1675, three Natives were executed after killing a man who had served as a translator to the settlers, which only further engendered distrust between the two groups. Metacomet feared the Natives would lose more land to the new arrivals, and built a coalition of various Native tribes to protect themselves and their resources. By the autumn of 1675, the coalition members began to clash with settlers, attacking settlements in Connecticut and Massachusetts.

The Narragansett tribe originally wanted to remain neutral, but wouldn't give up Wampanoag, who had taken refuge in their encampment, or turn away women, children and the elderly or infirm from that tribe who came to them seeking shelter from the conflict. As a result, the Puritans attacked the Narragansett stronghold, killing up to 600 Natives and about 150 settlers in the **bloody battle** and its aftermath.

The conflict further devastated Native populations

What was later known as King Philip's War ensued, so named after Metacomet's English moniker. The subsequent conflicts deeply impacted both the Native tribes and the colonies. Wampanoag abducted settlers and held them ransom, while settlers pillaged and destroyed Native villages. Much of the colonies were burned and looted, taking decades to fully recover.

Some Cultural Items for the Month

<u>Cultural Corner</u>: Aura Borealis - the land of the Northern Lights

Last month we had a sensational wonder in Saratoga and the states in the north east. We actually had seen the Northern Lights, over the lake, on October 11th, 2024, in Saratoga. A good friend of ours sent Roy these pictures. Roy and I just missed seeing

them. We were up there to close the summer camp the weekend before. It is something to think about when we close the house next year. If you could blow up this picture you would see the lights on the boats on the lake. The other 2 pictures are taken from the shoreline.





October is a time for all of us to witness strange things. It might be a ghost or a witch walking down the

street. It could be a lot of black and orange lights that will shine along our houses. This is an occasion that happens each year at the end of this month. To observe a natural experience, you will want to watch the skies in north Norway. The northern lights as visible most frequently from late autumn and winter to early spring. Furthermore, the best months are October, February and March. Even though it is possible to view the northern lights from all over Norway, it is definitely advisable to make your way north, as daylight hours become lesser and you are physically closer to the display. To see this phenomenon, it would be best to visit the auroral zone, the location beyond the Arctic Circle, where the Northern Lights occur. Tourists' favorite viewing locations are the coasts of the Norwegian counties of Trømso and Finnmark especially at <u>the North Cape (Nordkapp)</u>!

The northern lights are a physical phenomenon that occurs



when electrically-charged particles from the sun hurtle towards the Earth. The light becomes visible when the particles collide with gases in the Earth's atmosphere. This phenomenon can only be observed near the magnetic poles. The polar light in the

northern hemisphere is called aurora "borealis" - or northern lights - while the polar lights in the southern hemisphere are called aurora "australis", the southern lights.

The northern lights have fascinated and captivated people through the ages, and they are mentioned in texts written by Aristotle, among others. Chinese texts from 2000 BC also describe what may be the northern lights. The earliest explanations and descriptions fuelled the myths and mystery surrounding the northern lights, and it was not until the 17th century that the phenomenon was studied in a more systematic and scientific manner. A connection was gradually discovered between the northern lights and magnetic disruptions, and that the sun's activity influenced the phenomenon. In 1886, Norwegian physicist Kristian Birkeland formulated the first comprehensive theory on the northern lights based on these previous observations. Birkeland developed and reinforced his theory, and his work formed the basis for modern research on the northern lights. This research still continues today, and it has given us new information about the sun, the Earth's atmosphere.

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They can be many different colors. This is determined by the gases with which the particles from the sun collide. This, in turn, is determined by the altitude at which the collision takes place in the atmosphere. The visible northern



lights are from 56 miles to 93 miles generally above the ground, and the colors can be categorized roughly as follows: **More than 150 km**: Red light **120 km - 150 km**: Yellow-green light **Less than 120 km**: Blue-purple light. Green is the most common of all auroras. Behind it is pink, a mixture of light green and red, followed by pure red, yellow and lastly blue.

The Bayeux Tapestry: The Tapestry illustrates the various stages of the conquest, providing detail that is not available in the written accounts. The original Tapestry is displayed in Bayeux and a copy in the City Museum at Reading in Berkshire.

A remarkable feature of the Norman Conquest was its near-contemporaneous record in the Bayeux

Tapestry; strictly a work of embroidery rather than tapestry (being embroidered on cloth rather than woven into it). The origins of the tapestry, lodged in Bayeux Cathedral, are uncertain; perhaps executed at the direction of William's wife Matilda or by seamstresses in England at the direction of Odo, Bishop of Bayeux, and, after the Conquest, Earl of Kent, and given to the Cathedral at Bayeux by its bishop.

Battle of Hastings on 14th October 1066 Anecdotes and traditions from the Battle of Hastings:

Duke William's mother was Arlette, a tanner's daughter. The garrison of a French town under siege by William hung animal hides over the walls as a taunt on his origins. They regretted the joke when William took the town and put the garrison and population to the sword.

Norway aims to raise age limit for social media users

The Norwegian Government has said it wants to raise the age limit for social media used by teens in the country through an amendment of its Personal Data Act. In Norway, the act means users must be at least 13 years old to consent to social media collecting personal data.

The government said it now wanted to change that age limit to 15 years but parents would still be able to consent for children younger than that.

Initially, the amendment of the act would concern data privacy but the government said it "will send a clear signal that children under the age of 15 should not use social media".

In a press release on October 23, the Norwegian Government argued the proposed new legislation stemmed from its concerns about children's well-being.

"Half of today's 9-year-olds are on social media, and I share the concern that this can be harmful to children. We know that many parents find it difficult to avoid their children being on social media when so many other children are," said Minister for Children and Family Affairs Kjersti Toppe.

"Parents cannot stand alone in the face of the technology giants. That is why we are considering stricter legislation," she added. Her plea was echoed by Norwegian Prime Minister Jonas Gahr Støre in the country's media. "It sends quite a strong signal. Children must be protected from harmful content on social media," Støre told Norwegian media outlet *Verdens Gang* on October 23.

"These are big tech giants pitted against small children's brains. We know that this is an uphill battle, because there are strong forces here, but it is also where politics is needed," he added. According to Toppe, Norway is set to promote the idea in the European Union. Norway is not a member of the EU, but it is a member of the European Single Market.

"Parents cannot stand alone in the face of the technology giants. That is why we are considering stricter legislation," she said. "At the same time, the government is strengthening its supervision and information work for children's digital upbringing, and will promote Norway's views in ongoing processes in the EU on, among other things, systems for age verification." - The EU already regulates tech giants under the Digital Services Act. - Many social media companies have been under investigation by the European Commission for allegedly failing to prevent addictive behaviour among users.

Japanese group awarded Nobel Peace Prize 2024

Japanese organisation Nihon Hidankyo, a grassroots movement of atomic bomb survivors from Hiroshima and Nagasaki also known as Hibakusha, won the Nobel Peace Prize.

"Hibakusha is receiving the Peace Prize for its efforts to achieve a world free of nuclear weapons and for demonstrating through witness testimony that nuclear weapons must never be used again," the Norwegian Nobel Committee said in its citation. Witnesses to the only two nuclear bombs ever to be used in conflict have dedicated their lives to the struggle for a nuclearfree world. - "The Hibakusha help us to describe the indescribable, to think the unthinkable, and to somehow grasp the incomprehensible pain and suffering caused by nuclear weapons," the committee said.

Norway's government apologizes to Sami reindeer herders

The Norwegian government apologized to reindeer herders after activists spent a week protesting a wind farm that they say hinders the rights of the Indigenous Sami people in central and Arctic Norway. - "I have apologized to the reindeer owners on behalf of the government," Oil and Energy Minister "They have been in a difficult and unclear situation for a long time. I'm sorry Mutoka said that receiving an apology had been "a wish from my side."

"It is crucial for us to move forward. It is important that we now have a common perception that we are dealing with a human rights violation," she said after a meeting. Although the talks did not yield an agreement to resolve the wind farm dispute, Aasland said "that we are not ruling out any solutions at this time." The activists, mainly teenagers, began their protest a week ago and have blocked the entrance to several ministries in Oslo, Norway's capital, At the center of the dispute are 151 turbines at Europe's largest onshore wind farm, The activists say that a transition to green energy should not come at the expense of the rights of Indigenous people.

They once faced oppression of their culture, including bans on the use of their native tongue. Now they have their own parliaments, schools, newspapers and broadcasts in their own language on national radio and television. The nomadic people live mostly modern lifestyles, but still tend reindeer.(Read more at: https://www.norwaynews.com/norways-government-apologizesto-sami-reindeer-herders/) Norden Star
